Key points

- The subjects are split into six groups.
- Students will be required to take a minimum of five IGCSE qualifications and a maximum of ten.
- The IGCSE is a two-year programme of study.
- It is essential that students select subjects that reflect their current interests, ability and English proficiency.
- IGCSE subject choices will not automatically limit choices in the IBDP. Students and parents should have conversations with teachers, the counselor, and the coordinator to make choices that are best suited to each individual child's profile, language ability and future aspirations. Toolkit

What?

This toolkit is a skill set that is developed alongside the IGCSE course content across all subject areas. This skill set comprises of three areas:

Fundamental Literacy

This is the literacy we are most familiar with, our ability to communicate through reading, writing, speaking and listening. Many of our students are Second Language learners when it comes to English so supporting their English literacy development is crucial for success in the exams and beyond.

Digital Literacy

Digital literacy builds on fundamental literacy skills of communication but specifically related to digital platforms. The aim of developing digital literacy is to create responsible digital citizens who can find and evaluate information, and can communicate accurately and effectively through a variety of digital media.

Numeracy

The ability to use and apply mathematics is crucial to our everyday life from tasks as simple as shopping to more complex demands in the world of work; being numerate is essential. Through 'The Toolkit' students will understand how their knowledge and understanding of mathematics can be transferred to many different disciplines.

Why?

It is essential that our students have enough time to cover the Cambridge IGCSE course content and develop the skills that will enhance their ability to reach their full potential in the IGCSEs and beyond. It is well-researched that the best way to develop these literacies is to embed them into our teaching and learning and give students the opportunities to apply them in many different ways, in order to build a set of skills they can transfer to any situation.

How?

The Renaissance IGCSE programme affords students ample lesson time in each subject to cover the course content and the vital tools that students need.

Teachers will deliver the skills of these three literacies implicitly and explicitly throughout their course delivery, monitor and assess student progress in these areas, giving personalised feedback to students throughout their lessons.

First Language English (0500)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

Cambridge IGCSE First Language English offers candidates the opportunity to respond with understanding to a rich array of reading texts during the course. Candidates will use these texts to inform and inspire their own writing and write in a range of text types for different purposes and audiences. Candidates will develop both their speaking and their listening skills, delivering a presentation, and responding to questions and engaging in conversations. Candidates are encouraged to become appreciative and critical readers, writers, speakers and listeners.

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Could this subject be for you?

If you are reading at grade level, or above, in English and want to develop your skills – this is the course for you. A strong focus on improving your language use, reading comprehension, speaking, listening and writing skills. It will prepare you for English A or B English courses in the IBDP.



English Pathways

World Literature (0408)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

Cambridge IGCSE World Literature provides learners with the opportunity to gain further knowledge and understanding of international poetry, prose and drama as they study all three.

A range of inspiring international set texts have been carefully selected to offer a breadth and depth of literary study and to encourage lively and stimulating classroom discussion.

Learners study two texts for their coursework: one prose text and one drama text. For Paper 2, they prepare for one unseen poetry text. In Paper 3, they study at least one set text and have the option to study a further text if they wish to.

Throughout the course, learners are encouraged to practise their skills of close reading through the study of literary extracts, unseen texts and whole texts. They develop skills in analysis and interpretation of texts and are encouraged to express their personal response. Learners explore the conventions of genres of texts and the contexts in which works have been written, read and received.

These are highly transferable skills and can help learners in other subject areas, as well as equipping them for progression to further study.

If you enjoy literature and have a high ability in reading comprehension and writing in English, this is the course for you. If you like literature and wish to connect and learn about the world, then this will be perfect for you. It will prepare you well for the IBDP English A course.



English as a Second Language (0511)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

Cambridge IGCSE English as a Second Language offers learners the opportunity to develop practical communication skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing. Learners will be presented with a variety of stimuli that will build up their skills in reading and writing, listening and speaking. Learners will engage in conversations on a variety of topics, and develop their skills in responding to different situations and audiences.

Cambridge IGCSE English as a Second Language will enable learners to become independent users of English, and to be able to use English to communicate effectively in a variety of practical contexts. Candidates will get opportunities to practice English in real-world contexts and to develop English that supports their learning in many other areas. This course is also good preparation for IBDP English B.

Language Courses

Vietnamese as a First Language (0695)

Content Overview

What's this course about?

Cambridge IGCSE First Language Vietnamese offers learners the opportunity to respond knowledgeably to a range of reading texts during the course as a whole. Learners will use some of these texts to inform and inspire their own writing and write in a range of text types for different purposes and audiences.

The reading texts cover a range of genres and types, including fiction and non-fiction, and may also include other forms of writing, such as plays, essays, reviews and articles.

Learners are encouraged to become appreciative and critical readers and writers of Vietnamese. The syllabus tests standard Vietnamese.

If Vietnamese is your mother-tongue then you will have to choose this subject. It is the perfect preparation for IBDP Vietnamese A course and also helps you to understand the concepts of literature, that you can apply to any IBDP Language and Literature Courses.

Note: If you are a Vietnamese national and choose to opt out of Language A (Vietnamese), we offer the opportunity to attend the government-mandated classes during ECA time.

Korean as a First Language (Internally assessed)

Content Overview

What's this course about?

The course will provide your child with a better understanding of Korean culture, language and history and create a platform of knowledge and understanding with them that is crucial for effective communication.

Students are encouraged to read widely, both for their own enjoyment and to further their awareness of the ways in which the language can be used. The Korean Language and Literature course also develop more general analysis and communication skills such as synthesis, inference and the ability to order and present opinions effectively.

Assessments and reports in this course are designed in accordance with the school Assessment Policy.

Evidence will be collected to assess your progress towards achievement of the learning goals throughout this course. Formative assessments will be used by the student and teacher as on-going evidence. Formative assessments may include (but are not limited to) daily work, homework, quizzes, in-class observation, interviews, etc.). Summative assessments will be used as a summary of the student's achievement in an area. Summative assessments may include (but are not limited to) tests, projects, presentations, and essays.

Language Courses

Chinese as a First Language (0509)

Content Overview

What's this course about?

Cambridge IGCSE First Language Chinese offers candidates the opportunity to respond knowledgeably to a range of reading passages. Candidates will use some of these passages to inform and inspire their own writing and write in a range of text types for different audiences.

The passages cover a range of genres, including fiction and non-fiction, and may also include other forms of writing, such as essays, reviews and articles.

Learners will have the opportunity to read Classical Chinese prose texts to help to deepen their knowledge of Chinese culture.

We encourage learners to become appreciative, critical readers and writers of Chinese.

Chinese Mandarin as a Foreign Language (0547)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

The subject content is organised in five broad topic areas. These provide contexts for the acquisition of vocabulary and the study of grammar and structures. The study of these topic areas enables students to gain an insight into countries and communities where Chinese is spoken.

- Everyday activities (e.g., daily routines, food and drink, health, etc.)
- Personal and social life (e.g., family, hobbies, celebrations, etc.)
- The world around us (e.g., travel, environment, public services, etc.)
- The world of work (e.g., future plans, employment, etc.)
- The international world (e.g., global issues, cultural diversity, etc.)

The syllabus gives students opportunities to develop and apply a wide range of foreign language skills.

Candidates will be expected to read and understand a variety of written and spoken texts on familiar topics.

Candidates will be required to demonstrate understanding of the main ideas, opinions and attitudes, as well as select and extract relevant details and deduce the meaning of occasional unknown words from context.

They will also have opportunities to write in Chinese on familiar, everyday topics, and to speak the language by taking part in everyday conversations.

IGCSE Mandarin Chinese provides a comprehensive introduction to the language, covering pronunciation, basic grammar, character recognition, and everyday vocabulary. This foundation is crucial for IBDP Chinese B, which builds upon these skills by exploring more complex grammatical structures, analysing authentic texts, and developing your ability to engage in nuanced discussions on a range of topics related to Chinese culture, society, and current affairs.

Language Courses

French as a Foreign Language (0520)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

The Cambridge IGCSE Foreign Language French course aims to develop students' language proficiency with a focus on practical communication in everyday situations. Through engaging topics and interactive learning, students will acquire essential vocabulary, grammar, and structures that enable them to understand and express themselves confidently in French.

The curriculum is structured around five broad topic areas that provide meaningful contexts for language learning while fostering an appreciation of French-speaking cultures:

- Everyday activities (e.g., daily routines, food and drink, health, etc.)
- Personal and social life (e.g., family, hobbies, celebrations, etc.)
- The world around us (e.g., travel, environment, public services, etc.)
- The world of work (e.g., future plans, employment, etc.)
- The international world (e.g., global issues, cultural diversity, etc.)

Students will develop their skills in reading, listening, writing, and speaking. They will be exposed to a variety of written and spoken texts, learning to identify main ideas, opinions, and key details while also practicing strategies to deduce the meaning of unfamiliar words in context. Additionally, they will refine their ability to write clearly on familiar topics and engage in spoken communication through role-plays, conversations, and presentations.

Why Choose French?

French is spoken in around 30 countries and is an official language of many international organizations (United Nations, European Council, UNESCO, International Court of Justice, etc.). Studying French at the IGCSE level not only enhances students' linguistic abilities but also broadens their cultural awareness and global opportunities. French is widely used in diplomacy, international trade, scientific research, the fashion industry, gastronomy, and the arts. This course is particularly beneficial for students considering careers in these fields, as well as in international relations, business, and tourism.

Individuals and Societies

Business Studies (0264)

Content Overview

Understanding Business

This topic covers key business concepts, including business activity, economic sectors, entrepreneurship, business size, growth factors, types of organisation, business objectives, and stakeholder roles and objectives.

People in Business

This section consists of human resources, workforce motivation, business organisation, recruitment, selection, training, and effective internal and external communication methods for efficient management.

Marketing

This subject matter consists of the role of marketing, niche vs. mass markets, segmentation techniques, market research methods, the four Ps of the marketing mix, and strategies to influence consumer decisions, domestically and internationally.

Operations Management

This section covers production methods, productivity improvement, production costs, break-even analysis, quality management, and business location decisions to enhance operational efficiency and competitiveness.

Financial information and decisions

This topic consists of business finance needs, sources, cash-flow forecasting, income statements, financial position statements, and account analysis for decision-making.

External influences on business activity

This section explores external influences on business activity, including government impacts on economic, environmental, and ethical issues. It covers globalisation, multinational businesses, exchange rates, and the international economy. Legal constraints are also considered in relation to functional areas and business operations.

Economics (0455)

Content Overview

The basic economic problem

This topic introduces the fundamental ideas and concepts that underpin the study of economics, including the basic economic problem, factors of production, opportunity cost and production possibility curves.

The allocation of resources

This topic considers the fundamental principles of resource allocation through price mechanisms in a market economy. The market forces of demand and supply, market equilibrium and disequilibrium, and elasticity, form the core of this topic.

Microeconomic decision makers

The approach to learning about microeconomies taken in this topic is through the role of the major decision-makers: banks, households, workers and producers/firms.

Government and the Macroeconomy

This topic considers fiscal, monetary and supply-side policy measures used by governments, and examines the measurement, as well as the causes and consequences, of economic growth, unemployment and inflation.

Economic development

This topic explores the effects of changes in the size and structure of population, and other influences on development, in a variety of countries.

This topic explores global trade, specialisation, free trade, MNCs, forex rates, and balance of payments, highlighting causes and effects of globalisation.

Physical Education (PE) (0413)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

The syllabus provides candidates with an opportunity to study both the practical and theoretical aspects of Physical Education. It is also designed to foster enjoyment in physical activity. The knowledge gained should enable candidates to develop an understanding of effective and safe physical performance. Candidates will study all of the following topics:

- 1. Anatomy and Physiology
- 2. Health, fitness and training
- 3. Skills acquisition and Psychology
- 4. Social, cultural and ethical influences

Co-ordinated Sciences (0654)

The Cambridge IGCSE Co-ordinated Sciences course provides students with a comprehensive introduction to Biology, Chemistry, and Physics, offering a solid foundation for further study in any of the IBDP Sciences. This course enables students to:



- Deepen their understanding of natural phenomena.
- Develop an informed interest in scientific matters and their real-world applications.
- Recognise the value and limitations of the scientific method, learning how to apply it across disciplines and in daily life.
- Cultivate key attitudes, including accuracy, precision, objectivity, integrity, curiosity, initiative, and creativity.
- Foster a sense of responsibility and care for the environment.
- Gain insight into the societal, economic, technological, ethical, and environmental factors that influence and limit scientific studies.
- Build essential scientific skills that are valuable both for further education and everyday life.

A Double Award Qualification

One of the unique aspects of the Cambridge IGCSE Co-ordinated Sciences course is that it is equivalent to two IGCSEs. This reflects the breadth and depth of the content, as students study all three sciences—Biology, Chemistry, and Physics—at a level that prepares them thoroughly for future academic challenges. The Double Award provides added value for students aiming to pursue IB sciences or other science-related qualifications.

Topics Covered

- Biology: Cells, nutrition, and transport; diseases and immunity; ecosystems and inheritance.
- Chemistry: Atomic structure, reactions, and energetics; acids and metals; organic chemistry and analysis.
- Physics: Motion, forces, and energy; waves, electricity, and magnetism; nuclear and space physics.

Practical Laboratory Skills

Practical laboratory work is a vital part of the course, allowing students to:

- Design experiments and analyse data effectively.
- Safely handle scientific equipment and materials.
- Observe results accurately and interpret findings with confidence.



Electives

Drama (0411)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

Learners develop an understanding and enjoyment of drama through practical and theoretical study. Candidates will study:

- the elements of practical drama
- how to work with extracts from published plays as an actor, director and designer
- how to devise, develop and structure their own original dramatic material from stimuli such as short titles, poems, pictures, songs, historical events and stories
- how to evaluate their contribution to the devising process and the success of the final piece
- how to use staging and design as part of a dramatic performance
- individual and group performance skills and how they are applied to create character and communicate meaning to an audience.

Electives

Art and Design (0400)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

Cambridge IGCSE Art & Design encourages a range of skills, stimulates aesthetic awareness, knowledge and critical understanding of art, and provides opportunities for learners to develop a range of skills. Crucially, a personal and independent perspective is encouraged. The syllabus is designed to accommodate a wide range of abilities, materials and resources.

The broad areas of study are:

- painting and related media
- print making
- three-dimensional design
- photography, digital and lens-based media
- graphic communication
- textiles and fashion.

Candidates can respond to either component using any of the media above.

Assessment for the IGCSE Art and Design program is divided into two components: coursework and a final examination. The coursework component makes up involves the creation of a portfolio of artwork that demonstrates students' skills and creativity. The final examination consists of a practical examination that tests students' ability to apply their knowledge and skills to a specific task.

Music (0410)

Content Overview

What does Cambridge International say about the course?

When studying the Cambridge IGCSE Music syllabus, learners listen to, perform and compose music, encouraging aesthetic and emotional development, self-discipline and, importantly, creativity. As a result, learners enhance their appreciation and enjoyment of music, an achievement that forms an ideal foundation for future study and enhances lifelong musical enjoyment. Learners study music of all styles; each style is placed in its historical and cultural context, and learners are encouraged to be perceptive, sensitive and critical when listening. Although the majority of the syllabus examines Western European music, the music of other cultures is always represented.

Assessment Overview

Listening Skills: Students engage with a diverse range of music, focusing on Western European music while exploring global musical traditions. They develop critical listening skills.

Performance: The course requires individual and ensemble performances, with a total performance time of no less than four minutes and no more than ten minutes.

Composition: Students create original works, encouraged to experiment with different styles and techniques, including unconventional instruments and arrangements.


